MULTILINGUAL LEARNER

As part of its asset-based belief system, the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction (NCOPI) will now begin using "Mallingual Learner" (My.) when referring to students who use other languages in addition to English. This shift in language takes an asset-based approach to 1) avoid labeling students in terms of the language they on toy tet know; 2 acknowledge that students' first languages and cultures are a strength; and 3) reiterate the importance of literacy and proficioncy in multiple languages.

ML includes students who are commonly referred to as: English language learners (ELLs), newcomers, students with interrupted formal schooling (SIFE), long-term English learners (L-TELs), English learners with disabilities, gifted and talented English learners, and students with English as an additional language (EAL) (WIDA 2020).

We recognize that, in the field of K-12 education, various terms are used to describe MLs. For policy & legislation purposes, NCDPI will maintain the term "English Learners." For all other purposes, NCDPI will begin to use the term "Multingual Learners."

While shifting to this language is a local decision, we hope Public School Units (PSUs) will join NCDPI in using this asset-based and inclusive term.

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What is ESL? / ¿Qué es ESL?

ESL is a <u>program</u> which offers language supports for students who speak a language other than English as their home language.

Students must qualify to be in an ESL program, where they receive language supports in the classroom or through pull-out services.

ESL es un programa que ofrece apoyo a alumnos que hablan un idioma distinto al inglés como lengua materna.

Los alumnos deben calificar para ingresar a un programa de ESL, donde reciben apoyo en sus clases o en otra clase designada.

EL or ML are <u>students</u>. English learners/multilingual learners are students who speak more than one language.

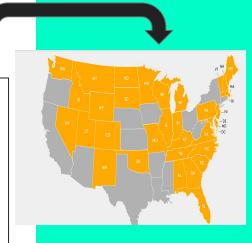
"EL"o"ML" se refiere a los alumnos multilingües.

North Carolina uses the WIDA Standards for our ML learners.
Students are screened according to their home language survey (HLS). If a parents

lists a language other than English, we are legally required to screen a child for language services.

ESL Services are required through Title III of the US Government.

All students who are screened and qualify for services are given ESL services until a time when the child exits the program through an **Access Test.**



Carolina del Norte utiliza los estándares WIDA para nuestros alumnos multilingües. Los alumnos son evaluados de acuerdo con su encuesta sobre el idioma materno (HLS). Si un padre indica que en casa se habla un idioma que no sea el inglés, estamos obligados legalmente a evaluar al alumno para determinar si necesita apoyo.

Los servicios de ESL son requeridos a través del Título III del Gobierno de los EE. UU. Todos los alumnos que son evaluados y califican

para los servicios reciben servicios de ESL hasta el momento en que el alumno salga del programa al aprobar la prueba ACCESS.

What is the Access Test?

Students who qualify for ESL services are tested annually on an Access Test. This test is taken K-12, until a student exits.

The Access Test has 4 Parts:

- Listening/Escuchar
- Speaking/Hablar
- Reading/Leer
- Writing/Escribir

Level 1: Entering

Level 2: Beginning

Level 3: Developing

Level 4: Expanding

Level 5: Bridging

Level 6: Reaching

^{*}A child must earn a cumulative score of 4.8 to exit program. Then they are monitored for 4 years by the ML teacher

What Happens After Access Testing?

- Students will continue to receive English language instruction
- Scores for the ACCESS will come home in May or June
- Each student will be given a score report and will be notified if he/she exits ESL
- School ACCESS scores will be part of Lexington City School's performance grades and overall test growth
